PLEDGE TO PUT AWAY YOUR IDOLS



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INTRODUCTION

"He shall be our God and we shall be his people." These words summarized the Sinai covenant that the Lord made with the people of Israel. It meant that God would care of them as his special people, and they would be devoted to serve him and no other god. Before the figurative ink was dry on the agreement, the people collected all their gold to be formed into an idol in the shape of a cow. Idolatry threatened their special relationship with God.

While many in America today are not tempted to bow down and worship a carved image of a cow, idols are everywhere. An idol is anything we put in the place of God, anything upon which we rest our identity, our significance, or our security. We are tempted to bow down at the altar of beauty, love, material comforts, and power. We are even tempted to make good things into god things when we place too much of our trust on our jobs, spouses, or children. Each of these can threaten your special relationship with God, too.

Joshua offered a challenge to the people at the end of his life. He declared, "Choose this day whom you will serve." The choice was clear: they would either serve God or idols. He vowed, "As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord" (Joshua 24:14-15). May we all like Joshua pledge to put away our idols and to faithfully serve the Lord.

TEXT: GENESIS 1:27; ROMANS 1:18-32

Summary: We are either image bearers or image makers.

1. What is an image?

2. After God created everything else, he gave special attention to mankind, saying "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness" (Genesis 1:27). In what specific ways do you think God hoped we would share his image?

What blessings or privileges come from being in God's image?

3. Paul describes sinners saying, "[They] exchanged the glory of the immortal God for images resembling mortal man and birds and animals and creeping things" (Romans 1:23).

What has been exchanged or traded?

4. Summarize Romans 1:14-32 to describe the effect this exchange had on those who made that exchange.

TEXT: EXODUS 19:16-20; 20:18-21; DEUTERONOMY 4:15-40

Summary: The Word of God is central to the worship of God.

- 1. Draw a picture of God.
- 2. The events at Sinai are unique in the history of humanity because God came down to the mountain to be in the presence of the entire nation of Israel. Based on the records of their experience in Exodus 19:16-20 and 20:18-21, draw a more accurate picture of God.
- 3. What application does Moses draw from the Sinai experience (Deuteronomy 4:15-24)?
 - Special Note: God describes Egypt as an iron furnace from which he brought the people of Israel (Deuteronomy 4:20). Casting something in a furnace was an integral part of making an idol, but God uses the illustration to say that he was the one making Israel in his own image as it was at creation.
- 4. Rather than a visual representation for God, Moses focuses on the special experience in hearing the voice of God (Deuteronomy 4:32-36). This demands special attention be paid to the word of God (4:40). How should the Christian similarly prioritize God's word in his worship?

TEXT: EXODUS 32:1-35

Summary: What is an idol and how can you identify yours?

LESSON 4

Summary: Our idols will fail as will all who serve them.

LESSON 5

A MODERN APHRODITE

TEXT: 1 CORINTHIANS 6:12-20

Summary: Discuss the idols of sex and beauty.

- 1. Aphrodite was the mythical Greek goddess of two things: sex and beauty. Which of these two do you think holds a more dominant place in our society? Explain your answer.
- 2. There was a famous temple to Aphrodite in the city of Corinth; it was rumored to have had more than a thousand prostitutes performing sexual acts as a means of worship. Whether that temple was still standing during Paul's day is subject to debate. Regardless, cult prostitution remained. That Paul felt compelled to address the subject meant that the city's beliefs and practices were infiltrating the church (1 Corinthians 6:15). To what extent do you believe the church today is being influenced by the world's beliefs about sex and beauty?
- 3. Summarize Paul's argument concerning sexual immorality from each of the following verses:
 - 1 Corinthians 6:12
 - 1 Corinthians 6:13
 - 1 Corinthians 6:15-17
 - 1 Corinthians 6:18
 - 1 Corinthians 6:19-20
- 4. Sexual sin may be one of the most difficult traps to escape. What practical advice would you give a Christian about destroying that idol?

TEXT: GENESIS 29:1-35

Summary: Use the tragedy and triumph of Leah to show the idol of love and family.

1. Leah was the girl no one wanted. In contrast to her sister, who was gorgeous, Leah was described as having "weak eyes" (29:17; This either meant that she was ugly or that her eyes were deformed in some way). Laban's actions show he just wanted to get rid of Leah, and Jacob didn't want her.

If you were Leah, for what would you hope to give joy and meaning to your life?

2. What does the meaning of each of her sons' names reveal about her hopes for her relationship with Jacob?

TEXT: GENESIS 1:27; COLOSSIANS 1:15, 3:10

Summary: The gospel of Christ is the cure for idolaters.

1. We have learned a lot about idolatry, namely that those who exchange being image bearers for image makers become as futile as their idols. The phrase "God gave them up" (Romans 1:24) sounds like God gave up on them. Is there any hope for the idolater? How do you know?

3. In what sense is Christ "the image of the invisible God" (Colossians 1:15)?

4. Paul states affirmatively, "If anyone is in Christ, he <u>is</u> a new creation" (2 Corinthians 5:17). Then he says that our new self "<u>is being renewed</u> in the image of its creator" (Colossians 3:10). Through Christ, how can we be both already and yet still becoming renewed image bearers?

TEXT: JOSHUA 24:14-28

Summary: Pledge to put away your idols.

- 1. Imagine you are among the tribes of Israel hearing the words of Joshua (Joshua 24:14-15). What would you say in response? What would be the next thing you do?
- 2. Joshua declared, "As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord" (Joshua 24:15). What are the practical steps for identifying and removing idols as a family?
- 3. Joshua challenged the people, highlighting the difficulties that come with making the decision to forsake idols for faithfulness to God (Joshua 24:19-20). For those who have put their significance and security in a idol, what difficulties do you anticipate in the process of removing them?
- 4. "Choose this day" reflects a decision that is both immediate and daily. When you wake up tomorrow morning, what decisions must you make to be faithful to God?

TEXT: DEUTERONOMY 6:4; 1 CORINTHIANS 8:4-6; REVELATION 5:1-14

Summary: Jesus is not another god; rather he shares the glory of God.

- 1. God declares, "I am the Lord; that is my name; my glory I give to no other" (Isaiah 42:8). How then can we give the same glory to God and Jesus?
 - Unless this question can be resolved, then any worship of Jesus is worthy of being called idolatry.
- 2. Summarize the claim in Deuteronomy 6:4. How is this claim unique among other world religions?

3. How does Paul in 1 Corinthians 8:4-6 interpret the Deuteronomy 6:4 to include both the Father and Jesus?

4. Peek into heaven and hear the song of those around the throne (Revelation 5:1-14). For what do they praise and glorify Jesus, the Lamb?
